Why Is Baptism Necessary?

What are the effects of receiving the Sacrament of Baptism and why is it so important? In order to understand the importance of Baptism, we need to go back to the beginning. God creates each person to be united with Him. When God created our first parents, Adam and Eve, they were united with Him in a relationship of love. God dwelled within the soul of Adam and Eve. This we call sanctifying grace. Sanctifying grace is friendship with God and a participation in His Divine Life. This was God's plan for all eternity and the purpose for which man and woman were created, to be united with God here on earth and to enter into the perfect unity of the Blessed Trinity in Heaven.

When Adam and Eve freely chose to disobey God, they separated themselves from Him. By their own choice, Adam and Eve, and in turn all their descendants, were no longer united with God. This is what we call the loss of sanctifying grace. Their relationship with God was severed. God the Father immediately promised to send His Son, Jesus, to re-unite us with the Blessed Trinity. This was necessary because there was nothing that Adam or Eve, or any human being since then, could do to restore what we lost through the problem of sin – our separation from God. It is important to note that God is always faithful, always loving, always merciful, and always desiring to be united with us.

During His public ministry on earth, Jesus established the Church upon Peter and the Apostles and instituted the seven Sacraments. Jesus made available these seven channels of grace through His Passion, Death, and Resurrection. It is through the Church that we receive the seven Sacraments.

The Sacraments are sacred signs instituted by Christ that restore our relationship with God. This relationship heals our human nature which is wounded by sin, thus

reuniting us with the Persons of the Trinity. The seven Sacraments are the means by which God has chosen to accomplish this restoration.

Grace of Baptism

The first of the Sacraments that Jesus instituted was Baptism. Through Baptism, we receive both the 1) forgiveness of sins and 2) God's life in our soul. These two principal effects accomplished by the grace of this Sacrament have several important aspects.

The forgiveness of sins includes the washing away of original sin inherited from Adam and Eve as well as the forgiveness of personal sin if the person being baptized is not a baby. The grace received through Baptism is a tremendous aid in the struggle against sin. This assistance against sin is necessary because Baptism does not erase suffering, illness, and death which came about through the Original Sin. Nor does Baptism erase our human inclination to sin.

The second principal effect is God's grace. We are now adopted children of God. Through Baptism, one truly becomes a member of the family of God, and belongs to Christ. In Baptism, a person receives faith, which is the power to believe the truths revealed by God about Himself; hope, which is the power to trust God, especially with things that seem difficult; charity, which is the power to love God above all things and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God.

Let us be thankful for the gift of our Baptism. Let us cooperate with the grace that we received in Baptism by being committed to daily prayer and receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation often and the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist every Sunday so that our relationship with Christ will grow stronger and stronger.

Treasure or Baggage or Jesus?

In today's Gospel, our Lord is taking a journey and He meets a young man along the way, and He invites him to join Him on His journey. But our Lord tells him that he has to let go of some of his treasure, so that he can be free to follow Him. The man however, becomes sad, because although he wants to follow Jesus, he finds that his heart loves his baggage more than our Lord. And so our Lord moves on without him.

And the treasure or baggage that can hinder us from being a faithful follower of our Lord, don't have to be big things or huge piles of money or lots of property.

There was a bag lady who carried her treasure in a shoe box. A shoebox containing just some pieces of colored string, a few dried flowers and some bottle tops. They were her baggage. And a tramp seeing her holding on to that box all the time, figured it had to be filled with money and so he attacked her, but she would not let go of her box until he killed her.

There was also a young man who one day received a terrible shock when his wife had left him. He was devastated. He had one of those jobs which paid more and more money the harder you worked at it. And so this poor man slaved day and night to pay off the huge mortgage of the magnificent house he had built for his wife and two children. But all the wife wanted was for him to spend more time with his family. That man lost his huge beautiful house which had become his baggage, in the divorce settlement.

Another man who was retired, has a magnificent vegetable garden. The man's wife begged him to leave his vegetable garden on Sundays, at least to go to Mass. But he declined, his garden became his baggage. Eventually the man had a stroke, and then he kept his bedroom curtains drawn, so he wouldn't have to look at the terrible mess his beloved garden, his treasure, had become.

So what is your treasure? What is your baggage that hinders you from being a better Christian a more devout Catholic? The young man in today's Gospel wanted eternal life, and I hope we all do. He was a good man as he even mentioned the fact that he kept the Commandments of God. Yet, he loved something MORE than God. And so his relationship to God was limited. He refused to go beyond a certain point to embrace God more perfectly.

Anyone who prefers father or mother to Me is not worthy of Me. Anyone who prefers son or daughter to Me is not worthy of Me... (Mt 10:37). And we might add Anyone who prefers any treasure to Me, whether it be money, house, or a vegetable garden, is not worthy of Me.

It is commonly known that most Catholics prefer to watch an hour's television rather than pray for ten minutes. To read huge novels rather than a tiny book about the faith. To drive 50 miles to watch a football or baseball game rather than travel 8 miles to Church. To spend \$50 in a bar or restaurant rather than put \$10 in a collection plate.

And we are not talking about bad people, but good people like you and I, like the man in the Gospel, they want eternal life, they want to be a follower of Jesus, they want to be a better Christian, but not if it takes them away from their treasure. You know our relationship with God is the one thing that we take with us into the next life. Every thing else, including our earthly treasures will all be left behind.

The invitation and challenge in today's Gospel is clear. Our Lord is asking each one of us to give priority to God in our lives, and to place our love for Him above other things and persons, and to remove anything in our lives which prevents us from saying yes to being faithful to Him. Only if we are willing to do this can we respond to His words: *Come follow Me!*
