

Three Important Types of Fatherhood

The first type of fatherhood is found in God. The divine Trinity is a God of relationships between three divine Persons. And this beautiful dimension of relationships is reflected in God's greatest creation; the human race, made in His image and likeness. The revelation of God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit is meant to give us an important understanding of the inner design of human nature.

Every human person is called to be in relationship with God. He is our Father, and Jesus is our Brother. As members of God's Family we allow the power and love of the Holy Spirit to dwell within us. For this reason we Christians call upon God as our Father, something Muslims, Buddhists and Hindus unfortunately are unable to do. A denial of the fatherhood of God can easily distorts our image of human fatherhood. And it is spiritually, psychologically and emotionally healthy for a human person to understand that our dignity is rooted in our bond with God as Father.

A denial of the Triune God as He revealed Himself: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, is also to some extent a denial of human nature and our need for whole relationships. "No man is an Island", says the poet John Donne from the 17th century. Much has been written and sung about this verse. But its basic meaning, is that we live most fully as humans beings only when we have wholesome relationships with others. The movie Cast Away staring Tom Hanks involves a FedEx executive who finds himself alone on an island after a crash. He made a "companion" out of a volleyball he found in the wreckage and named it Wilson. He talked to "Wilson" for four years out of a desperate need to have some sort of relationship with another.

The second type of fatherhood is found in the human race and is a reflection of God's fatherhood. Dr. Ditta Oliker, a popular woman psychiatrist, points out that: "Even from birth, children who have involved fathers are more likely to be emotionally secure and confident to explore their surroundings and, as they grow older, to have better social connections." She continues: "Fathers have an important impact on a child's educational, emotional and social development. Regulation of children's feelings and behavior are usually learned from fathers."

The lack of fathers and fatherhood is reflected in school dropouts, substance abuse, teen pregnancy, violence and crime in our schools and in our streets. Not everyone will have a good father, but it will be important for children to have a positive male role-model in their lives: grandfather, uncle, coach, step-father, etc. Because good fathers or father figures are a positive male role model, which helps a young boy to develop positive male characteristics and a proper respect for women.

Good fathers and father figures are also an important positive influence on young girls. Young girls are more likely to have a healthy and wholesome understanding of men, and will look for the good qualities they see in their fathers in a future spouse.

The third type of fatherhood is the spiritual fatherhood of a priest. A priest is called to be a spiritual father. He is entrusted by Christ and His Church with the spiritual welfare of the people he serves. A priest exercises his spiritual fatherhood when he baptizes a person, making them a part of God's family; when he hears confessions, as he treats the repentant sinner as a merciful father; when he preaches, helping those in his care to grow into healthy and mature Catholics; and when he celebrates Mass, providing spiritual food and nourishment for His spiritual family. A priest is a type of father, whose family goes beyond the ties of blood, and is joined together by spiritual bonds.

Let us pray to our Heavenly Father for all the various types of good fathers in our lives on this special day, and ask the Good Lord to bless them all abundantly.
