

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In 1968, I was in the college seminary in the Archdiocese of Chicago. I remember the night of the Chicago riots happening in the inner city following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. We were



huddled in the TV room watching the flames in the inner city. My fellow seminarians were worried about their families. Some had fathers who were police officers trying to stem the rioting, some were worried about their relatives and neighbors who lived in the area, and others were worried about the parish communities and churches they served in. The anger and hurt that accompanies any action certainly is understandable, but violence is never justified as a response. Simply stated, "Violence begets violence."

This past Saturday, the burning and looting in protest over the shooting of an armed 23-year-old African-American man in the Sherman Park neighborhood of Milwaukee generated a protest which led to violence on the streets of a neighborhood that is already economically-challenged. It was painful to watch.

Members of a neighborhood, who depend upon police protection, were fighting the police and burning and looting businesses that the community depends upon. Individuals were not protesting, but stealing. Protest is a right of every American; burning, shooting at legitimate authority and stealing, are not. In fact, those who committed these actions imposed self-inflicted wounds on the very community whose interests they claim to represent.

What causes a pot to boil over is the intensity of the heat. Appealing to families is good, but when we have been engaged in social reconstruction and have failed to support traditional families, there is no one to heed the appeal. Young people without something to do or participate in are prey to gangs, drugs or general mischief. Summer jobs and participation in sports always take the edge off of summer's free time, but jobs are scarce and youth activities few. Also, the community must take responsibility for policing itself as well. It must be the eyes and ears reporting gang activity, drug deals and criminal activities to local authorities. Then, if the police do not respond, we as religious leaders must take up that cause and challenge political leaders to be responsible for the sake of the community.

Supporting the family, building the economy and attacking crime are a wonderful formula for defusing the intensity that creates the "burn baby, burn" mentality.

I firmly believe that the loss of a strong faith that builds character and creates change is currently missing from our current, secular equation. Remember, it was faith that motivated and generated the change that Dr. King promoted. That faith in Jesus Christ has not changed. However, the commitment to live that faith has become dormant. It's time to awaken our confidence in Jesus Christ and the Gospel that presents us with the only true transformation which changes hearts as well as minds. It is the hope for our society teaching us to LOVE ONE ANOTHER.

ENTER THE NARROW DOOR

Jesus was a great traveler. What kept Him on the move was the proclamation of the Good News of the Kingdom. Jesus does not just teach the truth; He lives it. In fact, as Jesus tells us that He is the Truth. Have you ever realized that Jesus' traveling is part of His teaching? His traveling was not aimless; it had a direction. When we connect the dots, we see as the Gospel today says: making His way to Jerusalem. Jerusalem would be His narrow door that He would have to go through to accomplish His mission; a narrow door of intense suffering.

Someone said to Him, 'Sir, will there be only a few saved?' As we have observed during the election campaign, our politicians refuse to answer questions because often they seek to hide the truth; Jesus frames His answer to precisely illuminate it. He clearly tells those listening that the real question we should be asking is not 'Will many be saved?' but 'Will I be saved'?

He states, "strive to enter through the narrow gate." The Greek word for 'strive' is 'agonizesthi', from which we get the words 'agony' and 'zest', therefore it is by suffering and perseverance that we enter the way that leads to the eternal life of heaven awaiting us. Before us, uncompromisingly, stands the narrow door. We love wide doors with plenty of room to wiggle.

The modern way of thinking sadly among some Catholics is to change the Faith, to do away with the 'narrow' bits like contraception and abortion, living together outside of marriage, gay marriage and Sunday obligations. It is a clear expression of this tendency to accommodate the truth to suit the comfortably 'wide' ethics of the world.

But Jesus makes it plain that we can't enter the narrow door at our own convenience and on our own terms: "I tell you, many will try to enter and not succeed." The narrow door to the Kingdom is an illustration of the narrow demands of discipleship. This door stands open now and the merciful love of God invites us to enter by the way we live our lives because: Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door which will never open. We have all had the experience of pushing on the store door only to find it locked. We push and pull but the door doesn't budge. The store is closed and locked. Being locked out of a store is an inconvenience; being locked out of heaven is a final event.

To our surprise we may find ourselves arguing the case, making excuses for our sins, giving ourselves exemptions. "We once ate and drank in your company; you taught in our streets." Maybe we too have told ourselves. "I used to pray, I used to go to Mass. I used to follow the teachings of Christ and His Church. I used to be a good Catholic."

God will not be tricked into admitting into His Kingdom those who ended up ignoring or denying His teaching so as to fit into a worldly and sinful way of life. If any of us have been creating 'wriggle room' for ourselves by ignoring or rejecting the teachings of Christ and His Church, then we have cause to fear of being "locked out" of heaven. Today's Gospel is a warning to those who are unwilling to strive to live out in their lives the truth of the Gospel and teachings of Christ.

Now is the time to get rid ourselves of that false confidence and to listen once again to the words of the Lord in making the necessary changes to our life, so that we are truly striving our best to enter through the narrow door.






