Jesus Turned and Spoke to Them about Discipleship

Jesus had three things to say about being a disciple. The first thing Jesus says sounds quite demanding: "If any one comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, and yes, even his or her own life, that person cannot be My disciple." What did He mean by saying this? How do we respond to these words?

Our Lord uses shocking words, to make a serious point. Our Lord also once said "to cut off our hand or pluck out our eye" if these are causing us to sin, obviously, hands and eyes to not cause us to sin. Hating our relatives or ourselves means that our love for them or ourselves does not permit us to choose evil to please them our ourselves, over-doing what is good and right according to the teachings of Jesus.

His teachings , and the teachings of His Church, ought to be the norms we strive to live by. If we reject His teachings, then we cut ourselves off from the Living Vine and we will become dead branches. Putting Jesus first has very real consequences in the way we live our lives. It touches upon the use of pornography, artificial contraception, abortion, end of life questions, euthanasia, sex outside of marriage, the definition of marriage itself, work ethics, abuse of government programs, and even our attendance at Sunday Mass.

The second point Jesus makes is: anyone who is not willing to carry his or her cross and follow Him cannot be His disciple. This is getting difficult, isn't it? He is asking us to be a faithful disciple by allowing His teachings to shape our lives and our relationships, and now He is asking us to carry a cross. But really, if we put Jesus first in our lives we really won't have to go looking for a cross. Just being a faithful Catholic will bring about the cross of daily challenges and sacrifices which we can choose to accept and carry with both love and confidence. As Christians we accept this cross for the sake of God's kingdom. A cross that can become bearable and even attractive, as it produces a marvelous peace and inner joy which the Saints experience and talk about.

Next Jesus tells two stories: one about building a tower; the second one about a king marching to war against another king. And so He brings us to the third point: to see the end game in life, because we are building something in this world and we are waging a war in this world. What good does it do for a person to gain the whole world and lose eternal life in heaven in the process? Are we building our lives on solid rock or sand? Are we waging a war against sin, immorality and evil, or are we like dead fish floating downstream with all the other dead things in this world?

Susan came home quite sad and upset. Susan told her mother that the religion class had an auction and they were all given \$1000 dollars to spend. The teacher was auctioning things like popularity, good looks, sporting ability, fame, wealth, and so on. Down at the bottom of the list was heaven. Susan told her mother: *I wanted heaven and so I bid \$500*, but Margaret bid \$1000 for heaven, and so she got heaven and I didn't! Susan's mother asked her: Well, what did you learn? Susan replied, *I should have been willing to give everything to get Heaven*. A good lesson for each one of us!

RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

"You were created on purpose for a purpose." That may sound like pop psychology gibberish to you at first, but it is the truth. Modern studies into strengths and gifts, along with constantly new understandings of the complex wonder of DNA, lead us to conclude that each human being is truly unique. You hold within you a unique set of gifts that cannot be duplicated in the same way by another. What your parents may have told you about snowflakes growing up holds true for people too: No two are exactly alike.

However, we often live our lives in such a way that gives testimony to a falsity, that is, anybody can do just about any job. Positions in the workforce and in our parishes are filled with people who only fulfill one requirement for the job: they have warm bodies. (Meaning, they are not dead.) There are two realities that create this problem. First, we ask people to do things they are not equipped to do. We tell them to work harder at it and eventually they will get it. But I can guarantee that no matter how hard I try, I will not be able to lead an NBA team to a title. Sounds ludicrous on that level. But I assure you, it is no more ludicrous than asking someone that doesn't really like children to teach elementary catechesis. Second, we ourselves sometimes believe that we have nothing special to offer. We go through life having no idea what our gifts are and how to give of them. We take dead-end jobs and rarely share ourselves with the community. But you may just be the answer to a business or parish problem that, to some, seems unsolvable.

On this Labor Day weekend, thank God for the gifts you have received. Use them to elevate your labor, both in the work-place and in the parish. If you don't know how, there is help out there. You are not like everybody else. God has given you a purpose.

Cultivate a Vision Silent Weekend Retreat September 16-18.


You are invited to deepen your vision and cultivate peace, hope and harmony in yourself and in our world. This year we are excited to offer a dy-


