The Fourth Sunday of Advent: Behold

Behold! It was right there in front of him, but King Ahaz did not want to see it. The powerful nation of Assyria was threatening Judah, Israel and Syria. Israel and Syria had made an alliance. But King Ahaz was uncertain if he should side with Israel and Syria or with the Assyrians or remain neutral. This is when the prophet Isaiah came to him and told him to remain neutral and trust in God and he would then behold His Wonders. Ahaz balked at this. So Isaiah told him, *“If you want proof that my message is from God, ask for a sign, and God will provide it.”* Ahaz might have appeared to be holy and pious when he said, *“I will not tempt God,”* but actually what he was saying is that he didn’t want or need God’s help in such matters.

Since King Ahaz was not interested in God’s wisdom for his immediate political dilemma, the prophet Isaiah went on to give the most famous prophecy concerning God’s greatest help and wisdom to all mankind. God would save all His people for all time: *“Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and bear a son, and name him Immanuel.”* Seven hundred years before the angel Gabriel came to the Virgin Mary, the King of Judah was told how God’s wisdom would accomplish His plan of human salvation. Only King Ahaz could care less, as he did not want to behold God’s wisdom.

In direct contrast to Ahaz, today’s Gospel presents Joseph, a man who was also faced with a dilemma. He was married to Mary, awaiting the day that she would enter his home. Following the custom of the day, they had already exchanged vows before the Rabbi. That was the betrothal ceremony which made them husband and wife. However, they did not begin to live together, until after the large wedding feast, which could last for a week, and was often held a year or so after the exchange of vows.

It was exciting for Joseph, but then it all came crashing down. Joseph learned that Mary, who had not yet begun to live with him, was pregnant. Now, the reading says that Joseph was an upright man, a just man. According to the common interpretation of the law, he could have declared that Mary was unfaithful, guilty of adultery, and had her put to death. But Joseph was also a man of God who knew the Scriptures well, especially the prophecy of Isaiah. He could not believe that Mary would be unfaithful to him. Could Mary be the virgin foretold by Isaiah? He was open to the will of God and so he trusted in God plans rather than his own plans. Joseph was able to behold the wonders of God’s wisdom. Unlike Ahaz, Joseph chose the way of faith. He chose well. What must it have been like for Joseph to hold the King of Kings in his arms? Joseph had to have been a very happy man, for happiness is found in the presence of God.

There is a temptation for all of us to react as King Ahaz reacted, when confronted with difficult situations. We are tempted to trust in our own abilities alone, apart from God and His wisdom. Perhaps all of us, to some degree, has avoided God’s wisdom, because we are afraid that His teachings would demand too much from us.

“Behold!” the Church tells us on the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Behold His wonders as Saint Joseph did. Soon we will be giving each other Christmas presents. We can give those we love all sorts of things, but we cannot give them salvation, for only God gives salvation. And He gives salvation to those who trust in His wisdom. And a virgin shall be with child, and bear a son, and his name shall be Immanuel, which means God is with us. Behold Jesus, behold the Lord, behold salvation!



Prepare Your Heart

When you enter your parish Church any time during the four weeks of Advent, it is one of the very few places in which you will not hear Christmas music. The Christmas season begins the evening of December 24th, not on Black Friday or the day after Halloween.

Advent has a feeling and purpose all its own. It is a time of preparation in which your internal preparation is more important than presents, decorations and baking. Setting aside time for quiet reflection will allow you to ponder important questions such as: What does it mean for the world that the Son of God has entered into it? What does it mean that Christ has entered your life? It is essential to recognize that you won’t celebrate Christmas very well if you don’t reflect and pray about these things, if you do not hunger for Christ’s presence, if His birth is not a gift greater for you than any other.

I first came to recognize the need for interior preparation in the season of Advent during a family celebration on Christmas Day. Interestingly enough, it was a year in which I received a larger amount of gifts than usual. And I received a pair of boots that I had wanted for months. After our family completed opening our presents, I noticed a real emptiness in my heart. These feelings were significant enough that I started to ponder, over many days, the true meaning of Christmas and how the things of the world do not satisfy the longing of our hearts. (After a short time, I didn’t even like the boots.)

What does it mean for the world that the Son of God has entered into it?

When Adam and Eve freely chose against God, they separated themselves from Him. God did not abandon our first parents but promised to send His Son as our Savior, to reunite us with our Heavenly Father in a relationship of love. This is made possible through Christ’s Incarnation, Death and Resurrection. During Advent, you want to remember the incredible gift of the Christ Child and how life is different for each and every person since Our Lord’s victory over Satan, sin and death.

What does it mean that Christ has entered your life?

Each person is personally sinful and needs a Savior. If you are honest you must admit that you can be selfish, insensitive, lazy, greedy, ungrateful, shallow, uncommitted, spiteful...and the list can continue. You are reminded of the “bad news” of your personal sin so that you appreciate the magnificence of the “good news” of a cure. This is to prepare you for Christmas that is really the joyful “counterpoint” to sin. Advent sets the stage for Christmas joy by reminding you of the harmful effects of sin in your life. After your preparation during Advent, on Christmas you will have a deeper understand of the words at Mass: Today is born our Savior, Christ the Lord!”

Jesus is your Savior, and therefore you are able to overcome the temptations of Satan, habits of personal sin and eternal death by cooperating with God’s grace won for you by Christ on the Cross. Jesus loves you so much that He gave His life for you so that you can be united with Him in Sacraments and prayer, and forever in Heaven. Therefore, you are not alone; Christ is with you. In prayer, He enlightens, strengthens and frees you so that you can live a life of joy and peace, even amidst trials and difficulties. This is true for every single person who accepts the love of God.

How do you hunger for Christ’s presence?

Life is hectic and you have many things that vie for your attention. Even if you are too busy or exhausted from all that you desire to accomplish during this season, you can ask the Holy Spirit to give you a hunger for Christ’s presence and He will answer that prayer. Planning the specified time for prayer each day is important; otherwise it can so easily fall by the wayside. Making a good confession during the season of Advent is something you don’t want to miss. Your burden of guilt and the weight of sin will be taken away, which leads to healing and interior freedom. This cleansing from sin allows more room in your heart for the Christ Child. You can also fast from TV programs or desserts or other things that you like a little too much, which really don’t satisfy your heart. Fasting helps increase our hunger for Christ.

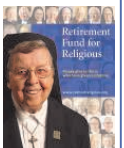
