From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! "Untold Stories of the Last Three Popes" by Bishop John Magee still ranks as one of the most fascinating talks I've ever heard. It was a Lighthouse CD that someone passed along years ago. Magee is the only person who ever served as secretary for three Popes: Paul VI, John Paul I, and John Paul II. One of the many fascinating stories Magee shared was that he couldn't find Pope John Paul II on the day of his Inauguration Mass in October of 1978. Here it was John Paul's first official day on the job, and Magee couldn't find the Pope. After checking everywhere, he asked John Paul's Polish secretary Stanislaw Dziwisz where the Pope might be. Dziwisz asked, "Did you check the chapel?" Yes. Then Dziwisz said, "Check it again – look more closely." And sure enough, Magee went back to the chapel and, after allowing his eyes to adjust to the darkness, saw a solitary figure prostrate on the floor before the Tabernacle. And so began arguably the most consequential pontificate of the last one thousand years.

Some of you remember Pope John Paul II when he was still a relatively young man. He would have turned 100 this past May 18th and whenever I hear his voice when he was younger, the passion and sincerity in his voice give me goosebumps. When I saw him at World Youth Day in 2002, he was well past his prime. We began Mass in a thunderstorm, but by the time the Pope began to give his homily, the sun emerged and John Paul was suddenly a young man again. Being with nearly 1 million young people seemed to energize the Pope, and I'll never forget the power of his words and example that day. At one point he said very poignantly, "*Every man is called to be a father*." Later, as we were heading home on the bus, we invited people to share how God had been working during the trip. One father came forward and said he never thought he had much in common with the Pope until he said those words about fatherhood. "*Every man is called to be a father*." In honor of all who are rightly celebrating Father's Day, here are a few reflections of what God had in mind when He shared His Fatherhood with men.

First, a consistent trait of holy people is that they honor their mothers with deep filial affection. Pope John Paul II's Mom died when he was eight years old and he missed her dearly for all of his life. But God drew good from his suffering, and his devotion to the Mother of God was a catalyst to both his courage and his compassion for our suffering world. When Father Streveler died on May 29th, Holy Name lost a faithful friend and a generous servant. Because he always kept it quiet, you wouldn't know how much he helped us with his generous financial gifts over the years. And it seems that he learned a lot of that generosity from his Mama. Included in his obituary was a beautiful tribute to his Mom, a small part of which is shared here:

Thank you mother. For putting up with my anger and impatience, For nourishing my hopes and dreams And helping me to love and care and cry. Thank you mother. For giving me the foundation on which to build To be able to love my people And to say "I love you" to the people in my life. Thank you mother. I love you.

Another hallmark of true fatherhood is deep spousal love and devotion to one's family. As I mentioned last weekend at Mass, we welcome Deacon Michael Maher to Holy Name as our newest staff member. I asked him to share a few words of introduction, and he graciously agreed:

Hello to the parishioners of Holy Name of Jesus Catholic Church and happy Father's Day as well. I am very pleased and excited to begin my service to God and to you.

First of all, if you are wondering, I am a father. In 1985 I was blessed to be married to my wife Linda. We have two sons and a daughter. All of them are married and our oldest son and his wife had a baby in March. So, we are brand new grandparents. I have often told my children that the greatest miracles in my life occurred the days that they were born. To hold that newborn in your arms is truly amazing. God entrusted these little lives to my wife and I and I have loved being a husband and a father and I have loved watching them become husbands, wives, and parents themselves.

I was born and raised in Wausau and after graduating from high school left to attend college. I was very blessed to be able to return to the city after graduation and began teaching History first at Wausau West and then at Wausau East. In addition to teaching I was also the Wausau East curling coach. After thirty-six years I decided to retire. That retirement was short lived because after one year I was asked to come out of retirement and to teach at Newman Catholic High School. I planned on teaching for one year, but my experience there was wonderful and I will now be entering my sixth year there.

I was ordained a deacon on October 29, 2016. From that time to the present I have been serving the Lord and the people of the Eastside Parishes in Wausau. I feel very blessed to have been called to serve Holy Name Parish. Those of you I have already met have been very kind, warm and welcoming. I look forward to meeting more of you over the next few months. Thank you for welcoming me to Holy Name.

The final characteristic of fatherhood that deserves some attention is a love that is always willing to forgive. Some of you remember May 13th, 1981 as the day Pope John Paul II was shot in Saint Peter's square. He probably should have died that day, but was spared by God and by the heroic competence and sacrifices of his doctors and nurses (one of the doctors gave of his own blood because he shared the same type as the Pope). The Pope, incidentally, always believed Mary, the Mother of God, had intervened (and in the year 2000, it was revealed that the 3rd secret of Fatima was for the Pope to be killed). Forever afterwards the Holy Father would say, "*One finger pulled the trigger, another guided the bullet.*" The one pulling the trigger became the recipient of the kind of mercy that can only come from Heaven above.

Pope John Paul II forgave his would-be assassin because Christ gave him the grace to do so. And the world saw that Christianity for what it truly is, namely a covenant with God who always keeps His promises, including His desire to forgive any sinner who approaches with a humble, contrite heart. Pope John Paul II forgave the man who tried to kill him and reminded the world that Jesus too forgave us as He hung upon the cross. "*Greater love than this, no man has. To lay down His life for His friends.*"

May God bless and guide our dear Dads - may their love of God and family bring hope and healing for us all!

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

There are many things of which we can be afraid: being rebuked, rejection, anger, being challenged, having to defend ourselves, standing alone, insecurity, failure, and even death. For some, identifying and overcoming their fears is a daunting task. Regardless of how much they may want to break the cycle of fear, they find that they remain close friends with old and dysfunctional behavioral habits and norms. Maybe what they really fear is change. There are many who gravitate to the familiar and comfortable, and find safety and security in doing so, even if they remain mired in mediocrity. Human beings have to learn that there is life beyond the "what has always been" and that happiness and depth are possible when old structures and systems have to be left behind.

Can you leave the near and dear, the comfortable and familiar, the safe and secure, and discover new opportunities? The shear thought of doing so can bring on feelings of apprehension, intense anger, resentment, defensiveness, reluctance, resistance, and even apathy. If we have to be responsible for making the change, cowardice can creep in. If someone else is to blame for making the change, any number of possible negative reactions are possible. In the end, only one thing is required and that is God. If I can rely on and deepen my relationship with God, especially in the Eucharist along with a community of believers, then little else is of great concern. We have to figure out what is really important. It is not always what we think.

The Gospel calls us to stretch ourselves and try new things, not to remain stuck and stagnant in familiar ways. We are asked to live life more deliberately, radically, and intentionally. We are asked to leave the familiar behind and learn to live with changing, and often limiting, human structures. We cannot get too caught up in the physical, ideological, or structural systems we are used to. The Holy Spirit always leads and guides us. If we trust this, we will find ourselves doing things we never thought we could do. Always seek the path to joy and love. They keep us from falling victim to our fears and from seeking the nostalgic crutches we think we need to achieve a sense of well-being and happiness.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults begins August 24, 2020

Are you considering becoming Catholic? Are you curious and want to know more about the Catholic Church? Would you like to be able to fully participate in the sacraments of the Catholic Church? If you answered yes to any of these questions, then joining the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

process may be right for you.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is a journey of faith for those who are searching and inquiring about what the Catholic Church teaches and believes. RCIA is not a class or a program, it is a process of conversion. The RCIA process will prepare you to begin your journey of faith which will hopefully lead to a lifelong commitment as a Catholic.

We're not all at the same place in our faith journey, and the RCIA process has taken that into consideration. It is directed towards individuals that are at any one of these places in their Catholic or Christian faith development: 1) never been baptized, 2) baptized but received little or no faith formation, 3) baptized and had faith formation in another religious tradition, or 4) received the sacrament of Eucharist but not the sacrament of Confirmation.

If you would like to become a fully initiated member of the Catholic Church all you have to do is sign up for the RCIA process. The first session for RCIA will be Monday, August 24, 2020 at 6:00 pm in the Parish Center. Sessions are held from August through April when participants will celebrate the Sacraments during Easter Vigil on April 3, 2021.

August 24th may seem like a long way off, but it's never too soon to begin to think about whether growing in your Catholic faith is something that you may be called to do. We hope you consider joining us as we journey together through the RCIA process bringing each of our own unique stories together to grow and build this One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church!
