From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! I wrote the following as a sample homily for the priests of our Diocese for Safe Haven Sunday (which we celebrated on February 23rd). Even if it didn't benefit any priest, it forced me to address a difficult topic and I thought you might enjoy reading it. Here it is:

One of my favorite pictures from my childhood shows my older brother and me in the kitchen, playing with the pots and pans. The thing that stands out most is that my hands were heavily bandaged. The story behind it was that Mom had left Dad in charge of us while she went to buy groceries. Dad must have been distracted and failed to notice that I was practicing my fledgling walking skills by holding the cabinets as I crossed the kitchen. I got to the oven and the window in its door was at the perfect height for me to use to prop myself up from falling to the floor. I found out the hard way that those oven windows were very hot in those days (Mom must have been baking something), and when my Dad came over to see what all the fuss was about, my little hands were covered with blisters. I think that was the last time Mom ever left us alone with Dad!

This weekend we consider the indispensable role of parents in keeping our children safe. And Safe Haven Sunday is a great title for a concern that we all share, namely that our children are kept out of harm's way. We live in a dangerous world and more than anyone else, it's our parents who help us the most in terms of learning how to avoid things that would hurt us. It's pretty clear that in many areas we are safer today than we were just a generation ago: one easy example is seat belts and car seats. Heck, we could get our whole little league baseball team in the back of my Dad's Mitsubishi truck as we traveled to games – you'd never get away with that today!

What stands out in the readings this weekend is that Jesus has a very different way of approaching the sadness of our world. We have a tendency to want to destroy it and revenge has always been an appealing way to settle old scores. But that is not the way of Our Lord – He promises that there will be evil in this world and that people will maltreat us. He says such things are bound to happen. Rather than encourage us to spend our time eradicating the world of evil influences, Jesus asks us to forgive it in whatever form it comes. He is clear about sin and its impact on the world – He is especially forceful when He condemns sin that damages children. But Jesus is wise in ways the world could not contain and the following anecdote is consistent with His way of teaching:

One of the best books I read in 2019 was The Hiding Place by Corrie ten Boom. While mostly the heroic story of a Dutch family's willingness to risk everything to help Jews during World War II, sometimes it was a powerful tale of the wisdom that we receive from our parents. For example, here is one of the best passages in the book: "Seated next to Father in the train compartment, I suddenly asked, 'Father, what is sex?' He turned to look at me, as he always did when answering a question, but to my surprise he said nothing. At last he stood up, lifted his traveling case from the rack over our heads, and set it on the floor. 'Will you carry it off the train, Corrie?' he said. I stood up and tugged at it. It was crammed with the watches and spare parts he had purchased that morning. 'It's too heavy,' I said. 'Yes,' he said. 'And I would be a pretty poor father who would ask his little girl to carry such a load. It's the same way, Corrie, with knowledge. Some knowledge is too heavy for children. When you are older and stronger you can bear it. For now you must trust me to carry it for you.' And I was satisfied. More than satisfied – wonderfully at peace. There were answers to this and all my hard questions – for now I was content to leave them in my father's keeping," (page 42).

Safe Haven Sunday is a beautiful reminder of the truth of God's beauty and how it is indelibly imprinted on each human soul. Because our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, we are taught to treat them always with love and respect. Original sin certainly wounded us and causes us to covet the flesh of others, even when we know this is not good for us. The Church, as our spiritual Mother, has long filled the role of a canary in a mine, warning us of toxic gases that, while hidden to others, could seriously hurt us. Or if you like, the Church is that radon detector in our homes that keeps us safe simply by being vigilant and alerting us to poison that could otherwise prove fatal. Sexual sin works like poisonous gas, especially because there are so many points of entry for temptation these days. As a mother, the Church helps parents to show their children true love, which means protecting them from things that are simply too heavy to carry. And while the temptations today may be more widespread than ever, the basic struggles remain the same. Saint John of the Cross summed it up nearly 500 years ago when he wrote, "What the eye doesn't see, the heart doesn't want."

Safe Haven Sunday helps us to protect the innocence and wonder that are so naturally found in the hearts of our children. Jesus taught that the pure of heart can see God. Given that the definition of heaven is the beatific vision, i.e. seeing God, well, that's something we definitely want for our children. Please God, let's work together to keep our children safe from sin, so that they will not only see God, but always know His love and mercy!

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Grace and sin, belief and unbelief, good and evil all exist together. While we wrestle with these two dimensions of reality inwardly, they are also witnessed in the actions and words of others. Many, all too often, beat themselves up because of their sin. We are also all too quick to pass judgment on others whom we perceive to be in error and walking down a wrong path. God does not make rash judgments, nor should we. Patience is the order of the day as is an understanding that God is ultimately the caller of the shots.

Our faith tells us that while God allows the wheat and the weeds to coexist, the wheat will always triumph. As long as we can cultivate even a little faith and a small measure of desire for God, He can produce abundant blessings and good things. Even when the weeds seem to have triumphed, there still may be a small measure of faith remaining that can be cultivated and grown. It doesn't take much! Unless a person totally allows the weeds to reign, there is always to be found at least a small measure of faith, good, light, and love. With even this small portion, God can produce abundant growth.

Admittedly, it is easy to give into the weeds, and they grow very quickly. Any gardener knows this to be true. Sometimes, the weeds even seem more attractive and vibrant. Dealing with weeds can quickly become a losing battle, and they can look healthier and grow faster than the very plants we are trying to protect. It's easy to give into them and let them win. While God will deal with all things in due time, we are responsible for keeping things in check in the short term. It is our task to keep our eyes fixed on God's presence and mercy. We are asked to avoid judgment. And, it is not our responsibility to deal with the weeds in someone else's garden, only our own. One garden is enough responsibility for anyone.

Weeds have power. We have to realize this. While they can appear attractive and healthy, they can quickly choke us off from God's presence. Our task is one of maintenance and cultivating a desire for God. Even the smallest kernel of faith can grow into something wonderful. In God's time, the eternal harvest will come, and we will no longer have to worry about the weeds.






