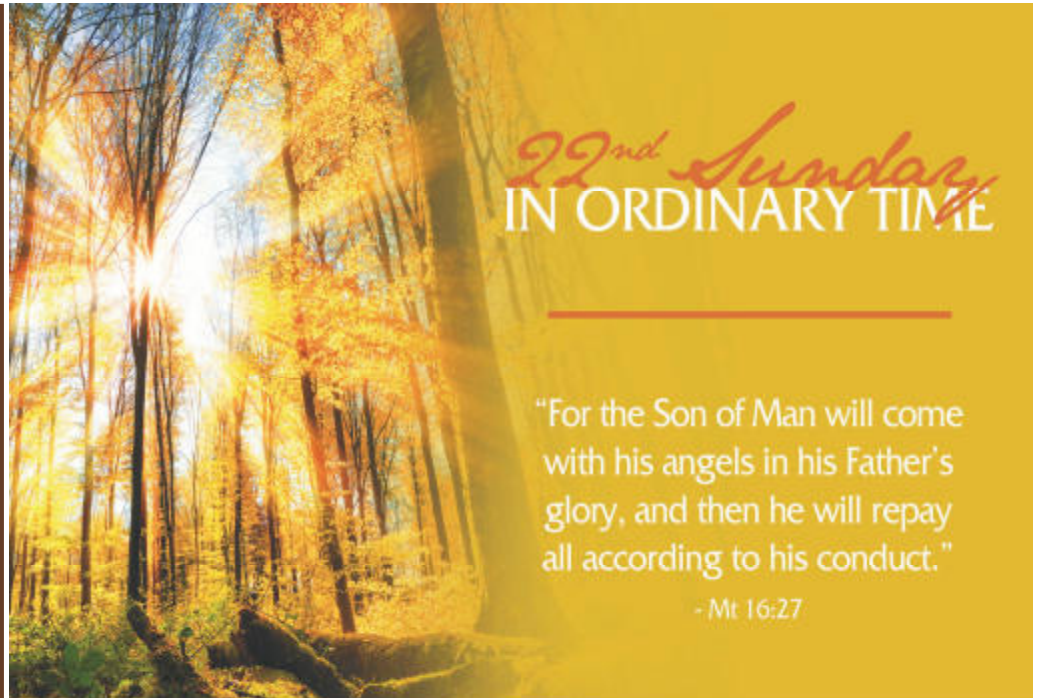

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! With school beginning in one form or another, it's time to reminisce and there's nothing better than a "*What I did on summer vacation*" essay. Before you collectively groan ("*Oh no, he's going to bore us with yet another autobiographical tale*"), take a moment and think back to Memorial Day. Do you remember what you did that day? For some of us, remembering what we did yesterday might be about all we can handle. For the record, it was a very warm day in the morning, but then we had midday rain. The afternoon was clear and somewhat humid, which really was a sign of things to come. As I walked around the city there was the pleasant smell of backyard barbecues and a tangible sense of peace. It was a wonderful beginning to summer.

Now steel yourselves, because this first part is going to be about me! One of my goals is to reach all 50 states before I die, and at this point I'm short six (Alaska, Delaware, Idaho, New Hampshire, Oregon, and Vermont). This year was going to be the trip to Alaska in June, but we cancelled early enough to get a full refund. Instead, we travelled to a friend's cabin on Pipe Lake (near Cumberland) and then headed up to Bayfield for a few days. The weather was spectacular (it was the middle of June) and we were outside every day enjoying the beauty. We kayaked quite a bit, including a trip on Lake Superior to see the famous caves. We also did some sailing one afternoon and saw three of the Apostle Islands. We ate out on the deck in the evenings and played some board games too. We never watched television a single time, which means we were genuinely enjoying each other's company. As for Alaska, who knows if and when I'll get there. While it's fun to have goals in life, one thing COVID has taught us is that we're just not in control of everything.

As you recall, we hosted a seminarian (Tim Reither) for the summer. He arrived on May 13th, but still had a couple of weeks of classes to "attend" (on-line) and then many final exams to pass. He finished officially on June 19th and then I knew he'd be hoping for some excitement from time to time. One of the things we did was visit some of the churches in our diocese that he hadn't seen. For example, I took him and two others down to visit Saint Anthony's in Cazenovia and Sacred Heart in Lone Rock. The idea was that I wanted them to know where the Bishop would send them if they misbehaved! In all seriousness, we live in an incredibly beautiful state, and those two parishes in Richland County are ideally situated. We also visited churches in Boyd, Cadott, Marathon City, and Rock Falls. The last one was the only church in our Diocese that I had never visited. I'm still waiting for the Bishop to send me my congratulatory letter now that I've seen them all.

Tim and I were also able to host seminarians on at least four different occasions. Thanks to some of you for cooking, we could share a meal with the future priests in our area. We had as many as eight guys for dinner and sometimes they'd stay and play euchre late into the night. It was wonderful to see their joy and the hope that they bring. I remember being a happy seminarian too, but that was many years ago . . . you know I'm just kidding! I'm still happy, thanks be to God and to my wonderful parishioners.

Tim and I watched some good movies together too. "Life is Beautiful" is one of my favorites, and we invited John Duranso over for that one. We also watched "Twelve Angry Men" together – that's the Henry Fonda film that was produced in 1957 and is still an absolute classic. Insofar as "*all work and no play makes us dull boys*," we watched "What about Bob?" with Bill Murray. I explained to Tim that it's really a story about clingy parishioners. He always seemed to appreciate the wisdom that I was sharing with him.

Some friends invited us fishing and we were grateful for the chance to get out on the water. We were told that the water temperature and the ample food available to the fish made catching them a real challenge this summer. I caught a handful of small perch, but that was about it. The two times we fished were on beautiful lakes and just being outside was wonderful. I'd tell you I smoked a cigar while fishing, but in the event that there are young, impressionable people reading this, I'll abstain.

I love walking, and though we had an inordinate amount of heat and humidity, I was able to walk just about every day. My usual circuit is up to Marathon park, three loops, then home. Tim had his road bike here and he made multiple trips around Rib Mountain during the summer. Both of us love to read, so that was another one of the joys of summer. We each read Alexander Manzoni's The Betrothed and loved it.

One last highlight was visiting family. First, we visited Tim's family. He lives east of Chippewa Falls and comes from a family of six kids (he's the third oldest). On my birthday I drove home to visit my parents and all four of my siblings. It was a wonderful day spent on the farm where I grew up. Every time I go to the farm, I remember Dorothy from "The Wizard of Oz:" "*There's no place like home, there's no place like home, there's no place like home.*" And I thank God I'm not from Kansas!

Looking back and counting our blessings is essential to living with hope and joy. We need a little help from the Holy Spirit to do this, otherwise we tend to remember the failures and not the blessings. Doing this every day gradually changes our hearts so that we look forward to each new day with the hope that something good might happen. And when our hearts are eager to embrace life, our hope becomes contagious. Remembering the past with gratitude prepares us to live in the present with hope and to look forward to the future without fear. Ask the Holy Spirit every night before you go to bed to show you the day as He saw it. You'll be pleasantly surprised at how many good things we forget that make life worth living.

May God bless our students and teachers and parents as summer wanes and school beckons!

22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Secular pursuits only bring a temporary amount of satisfaction and fulfillment. As much as we may think that achieving worldly success, economic security, personal well-being, and self-fulfillment are worthy goals to obtain, they all are dependent on external variables and can lead to emptiness. We are trained to be very pragmatic and productive. Unless we are able to check off all of the boxes or comply with specific measurable requirements, our value and worth becomes questionable. Corporations, educational institutions, systems, structures, and secular ideology rarely consider deeper, more spiritual, and human contributions a person can and needs to make.

To the secular mind, the wisdom and ideals of the Gospel are making less and less sense. Consider for a moment this question: "What profit would there be for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?" While Jesus is asking this very challenging question to people who are considering his message, many in our world are in a quite different place. Whether we realize it, many folks are asking a much different question. Why would you not want to gain the whole world and secure your life? If you look at where a lot of folks are investing their time, energy, and resources, it becomes obvious where current priorities rest.

Modern day comforts and possibilities are backing us out of our relationship with God. The fire burning in every human heart is trying to find its satisfaction in the things that humans have created and not God. Being altruistic and offering compassion for those most in need becomes a political responsibility or responsible gesture. We realize that our hearts need to be centered on something and someone who calls us out of ourselves, but we struggle and battle with naming the source of that call. God places the desire to seek, find, and love Him in the core of every soul. We are not abandoned and left to fend for ourselves. But we can easily get confused. We know that when we extend ourselves to another self-sacrificially, we are doing what is just and right. We know that we can work through suffering and loss and come out better and more whole on the other side.

Our minds need to be renewed so that they can begin to understand that there is much more to who we are, and that faith plays a pivotal role in achieving our true and everlasting goals. It is when we see that it is only faith that can bring us to this heightened awareness of ourselves and God that it will begin to make sense. Then, we can put things in proper perspective and consider being a disciple.

2020-2021 Religious Ed Needs Catechists in Classroom and Virtual



With the many changes in our program for this year, we will need Catechists and aides to be part of classroom instruction, as well as part of virtual check-ins and weekly classes. If you would like to help but don't want to teach, we have a very important role for you! The Diocesan Safe Environment standards require that two adults be present on each meeting. You could help by just being present for a 20-40 minute meeting online. The meeting length and frequency varies by grade level; you can pick what works best for you. Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Level 1 Atrium to Begin

What is Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS)? CGS is an approach to the religious formation of children ages zero to twelve. It is rooted in the Bible, the liturgy of the church, and the educational principles of Maria Montessori. Children gather in an "atrium," a room prepared for them, which contains simple yet beautiful materials that they use.



Children have a natural relationship with God. They need us to merely name that relationship and give them the tools to further know and grow with God. We offer them the Word of the Bible and the act of liturgy to invite them into a deeper reality of that which they already experience, the love of God.

Holy Name is setting up a Level 1 Atrium for children 3-6 years old this year, which follows Level II that began in 2018 for the Religious Education students. Setting up an atrium is no small feat. The amount of items that are needed to create an environment that fosters the relationship between the child and the Church involves many pieces. So far it has included gathering shelves, cabinets and tables.

Also we've built many pieces that need to be fashioned as close to the real thing as possible. Virgil Arrowood has been busy this summer helping us with this project by making us an altar, a sacristy cabinet, a lectern, a tabernacle, an upper room, vestment holders, and a book cabinet to hold the individual bible stories and books. We are very grateful to have such a wonderful craftsman in our parish, and look forward to seeing these items be used for years to come.

But we still need many things and are hoping they might be donated. This room is for 3-6 year olds so items should be relative to them in size. Items needed are: low shelves, child size chairs, tables about the height of an end table or night stand, cabinets similar in size and a small coffee. All furniture must be wood with little to no embellishments.

In addition to the furniture we need: a San Damiano cross (St. Francis cross) for wall and altar, statues of Jesus as the Good Shepherd, Mary at Lourdes, Lady of Guadalupe, the Holy Family, angels, and saints all should be painted, realistic and 7"-8". Also, white taper candles, metal candle holders, candle snuffer, area rugs with burgundy as main color, small glass jars with wide mouth, small-medium sized ramikens, large baby food jars, wooden boxes with lids and metal or wood simple napkin rings.

Finally, we are looking for a seamstress that could make vestments, purificators, altar clothes and other items needed to help the children learn about the Mass and other items that hang on the walls in the atrium. These items would need to be sewn and either embroidered or decorated without too much embellishment.

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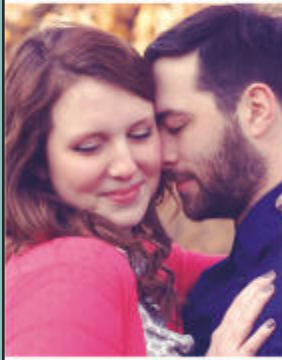
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
