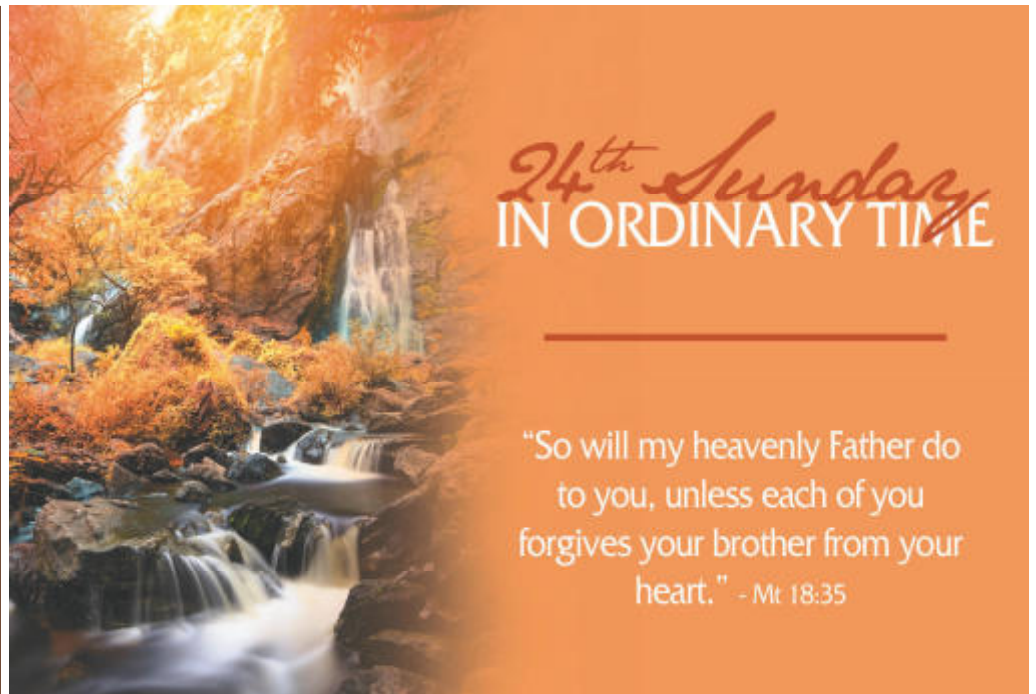

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! This is a story with an incredibly happy ending. It has to do with your generosity and how we ended our fiscal year of 2019-2020 (keeping in mind that our year runs from July 1st to June 30th). When reporting on the fiscal state of the parish, a friend of mine always began with the end of the story. He said that ever since he was a kid, he was fond of reading the last page of the book first and that's what he did when submitting his report about parish finances. It was an effective approach, so let's begin with the end of the story.

We ended the fiscal year \$118,250 to the good, which is all the more incredible if you recall that we were budgeted to end the year \$109,078 in the red. God knows you can handle basic math, but that's a turn-around of \$227,328! As alluded to in the first paragraph, this is a story about your generosity. It's also the story of a Provident Father who is helping us to get back on our feet. Now that we've read the last page, let's see how we got there.

One of the keys to our success came thanks to Saint Ambrose Financial Services. If you recall, they waived the interest we're paying on our debt for the next two years. That saved us \$34,000 last year and will again save us that much in the year to come. Friends in high places are a blessing and we do well to thank God with our prayers and sacrifices. God knows many made heroic sacrifices this past year, as our adult envelopes and offertory increased by nearly \$100,000. Again, these are historic numbers and we do well to thank God for the hope that this brings. Another source of income that led to the dramatic turn-around came in the form of private gifts from both parishioners and friends of Holy Name. Finally, because of the coronavirus, we received just over \$40,000.00 from the federal government in the form of a forgivable loan. That allowed us to keep everyone on the payroll during the quarantine.

While our income was up, our expenses were down. Because of generous giving and lower expenses, we were in a position during the quarantine to replace all the lighting in church with LEDs. We also updated the sound system, painted the interior of the church, and replaced all of the carpet – these were mostly funded by private gifts donated by our own parishioners. And we're presently paying \$48,000.00 toward our debt to Saint Ambrose. Because the debt is rather large and may seem somewhat mysterious to you, allow me a few words about where we're at and how we're moving forward.

As far as I can tell, Holy Name had been gradually falling behind in the years when our school was still open. We were nearly \$600,000 in debt when our school closed in 2004. Presently, we're nearly twice that much in debt, coming in at just under \$1,200,000. That's a big number, and I'm sorry if it shocks you. We've had some tough years, but maybe we're turning a corner now and can begin to hope for better times. The silver lining is that we're beginning to pay it down and if we can manage to live within our means, in five years we'll owe less than one million. That may not sound like much, but sometimes all it takes is a little progress in the right direction and things take off like a bat out of, well, they take off in a most impressive way!

Just one more word about our debt. This is money that we effectively borrowed from other parishes. That's why we are earnestly attempting to pay it back. And we do have our friends in high places, (i.e. the folks at Saint Ambrose Financial Services). They want us to succeed and get back on our feet, and whatever we can do to diminish the debt will be met with open arms (and maybe some debt forgiveness?). Because this past year was a financial success, it's clear that with your generosity and the grace of God we are on a path to greater freedom and hope.

Having looked back, it's time to look forward. That's the relentless nature of life; time stops for no man. By the time you read this we'll be on the cusp of renewing our commitment to the Diocesan Annual Appeal. As in the past, this is our first hurdle. When I arrived in July of 2019, we had finished nearly \$10,000.00 short of our goal. Insofar as this is essentially a bill, Holy Name had to pay that money and it was taken from the Summerfun earnings that year. If we each do our part, that's money the parish can use elsewhere. We made our goal last year, which means we can do this if we work together. If you're able to give more than last year, please do. God knows we have some people who may have to give less.

Speaking of Summerfun, due to COVID-19 we were unable to host our annual event this year. That represents a shortfall of \$40,000, which is typically what we make on Summerfun. Thankfully we've recovered nearly \$25,000 of that through our ticket raffle (which earned just over \$10,000 – maybe the best raffle ever!), pizza sales (thanks, Papa Murphy's of Weston), rummage sales, taco sales (thanks, El Tequila Salsa), and your Summerfun envelopes. Please continue to patronize our future events, as they're necessary for us to make our budget.

Finally, because I'm no financial wizard, I have to keep things simple so that I can better understand. To wit, we are a parish that needs to bring in around \$500,000 of income each year to balance the budget and continue to pay down our debt. That's a little less than \$10,000 per weekend. If you've been following the weekend collection numbers in our bulletin, they've increased dramatically over the past year. We're in range now to make our budget annually if the generous giving continues. Last year was amazing, almost a miraculous turn-around from what we expected. But lest we become complacent, there were some big gifts that may or may not be given again. That means we'll need all hands-on deck if we're to continue to accomplish our goals. Congratulations on exceeding all of our goals last year! But, to quote an old song by Foreigner, "*that was yesterday . . . but today life goes on.*"

May God be praised for raising up generous people whose tremendous love is proven by sacrifice!

What right do we have to limit the amount and degree of forgiveness we show to others when we are so desperately in need of it ourselves? In not wanting someone who hurt us to downplay or forget the gravity of their wrong, we cling to anger, resentment, and wrath as a way of maintaining control. It is a way to acknowledge and express our deep hurt. We fail to realize that in doing so we hold ourselves hostage to these destructive feelings and actually become mired in the bondage of sin. All we gain is further alienation from ourselves, others, and especially God. We are no longer free but tethered to all of this unresolved negativity. Don't we really want to let it go? The fact is that we need to.

A good self-reflective posture will quickly show us that when the shoe is on the other foot and we are the ones in need of forgiveness, we desire it above anything else. This is especially true with our relationship with God. It is hypocritical to want one thing for ourselves and something else for another. Yet, many act in precisely this way.

Perhaps we think that in offering forgiveness, even for the most grievous of wrongs, somehow excuses the person of their wrong and makes it almost acceptable. This is what makes revenge, retaliation, and punishment so attractive. We see forgiveness as being an eraser that easily wipes away the offense without consequence. Or, we may believe that in offering forgiveness I must somehow forget the wrong and open myself as a victim of even greater possible hurts in the future. In fact, forgiving my sister or brother of their wrongful actions or attitudes involves none of this. It does not erase anything or position me vulnerably as a doormat to be walked on.

Forgiveness is an act of freedom that restores honest dialogue, shares true, and heartfelt feelings and acknowledges the consequences of an action. It admits that the wrong has caused a hurt that must be healed and squarely positions responsibility on the offender. The act of forgiveness recognizes our sinfulness and brokenness. It also admits that the most saintly among us is capable of doing very grave and deep harm to another person. It sees that we all can be victims of our passions and works in progress that deserve unlimited chances to get it right. With forgiveness, I release myself from the bonds of negativity and pursue a path of restoration, wholeness, and healing. I do not forget the wrong nor do I dismiss it. Sometimes, we have to stay far away from the one who hurt us. But we can still heal internally and be free.

For the one who wants to be forgiven and the one who needs offer forgiveness, the journey can be an adventure in learning what brought us to this place and what is needed to move forward. This is exactly how God treats us. Why would we not want to do the same for others?

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

What is Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS)? CGS is Montessori-based Catholic faith formation program where children can grow in their relationship with God through a deep engagement in Scripture and liturgy.

CGS is based on the belief that God and the child are already in a relationship. Our work as adults is to provide a place for the child and God to come together and grow.

The children gather together in the atrium, a room specially prepared for them where they can come to know Jesus, the Good Shepherd. The atrium is prepared with materials that children work with a way of meditating upon the essentials of our faith found in Scripture and in liturgy. Examples of materials found in the atrium include small clay figures of Jesus and the disciples used to meditate on the Last Supper; detailed interactive maps of the Land of Israel and the City of Jerusalem to help situate Jesus as a real person in time; Jerusalem Mustard Seeds and beautiful pearls to help ponder the Parables of the Kingdom of God; and a small Baptismal font and Paschal candle used to explore the significance of Baptism.

Holy Name is setting up a Level I atrium for children 3-6 years old this year, which follows Level II that began here at Holy Name in 2018 for the Religious Education students.

Volunteer & Parent Annual Diocesan Safe Environ Training



Just a reminder to all parents, and volunteers, don't forget to do the annual required Diocesan Safe Environment Training.

Training can be found at www.dioc.org. Link to Safe Environment training and then to volunteer or parent. Follow directions and a notice will be sent to our office once it has been completed. Thank you for your help!

Setting up an atrium is no small feat. Volunteer help is still needed to meet our projected start date of 9/23/20.

We need helpers with these items:

1. Cutting and assembling small wooded figures. These include people and animals, as well as small puzzle pieces.. All plans are available with CGS specifications.

2. Sewing of vestments, altar clothes and other items needed to help the children learn about the Mass and other items that hang on the walls in the atrium. These items would need to be sewn and either embroidered or decorated without too much embellishment.

Items still needed:

1. San Damiano crosses (St. Francis cross) for wall and altar.
2. Statues: Jesus as the Good Shepherd, Mary at Lourdes, Lady of Guadalupe, Holy Family, angels, and saints - *all should be painted, realistic and 7"-8" tall.*
3. White taper candles, metal candle holders, and candle snuffers.
4. Area rugs with burgundy or green as main color.
5. Small glass jars with wide mouth, large baby food jars.
6. Wooden boxes with lids.
7. Metal or wood simple napkin rings.
8. Small globe on stand.

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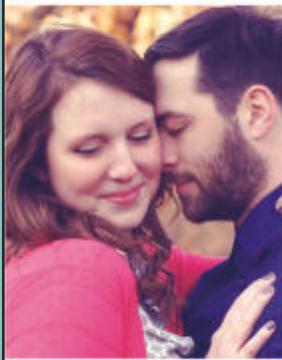


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
