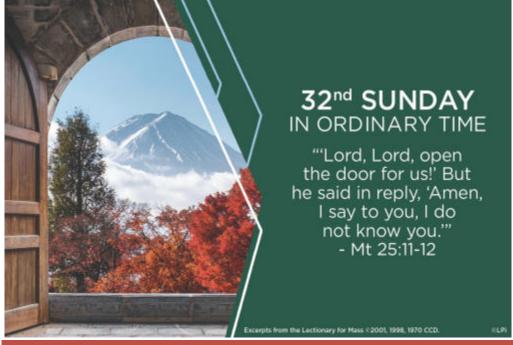

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! What a difference a year makes. It was about this time last year that I watched the musical "Annie" at Wausau West. Given the ongoing struggles with COVID, it will be a while before we're able to do such things again. Thankfully, God gave us the ability to remember things. It's amazing how much joy we derive from sharing memories. For example, because I just finished a book about fasting, I've been remembering the first musical I ever saw: "Oliver." Based on Charles Dickens' book, <u>Oliver Twist</u>, it's roughly the male equivalent of "Annie." Why I would think of "Oliver" while reading a book about fasting has everything to do with its most famous song, "Food, Glorious Food." Maybe you remember the opening lines.

Food, glorious food... we're anxious to try it
Three banquets a day, our favorite diet!
Just picture a mammoth steak, fried, roasted or stewed
Oh, food, wonderful food, marvelous food, glorious food!

Someone asked recently if I could recommend a good book about fasting and I had to admit that I didn't really know of one. We hear about fasting from time to time, but it's clear that we're a lot less serious about it than our ancestors were. But it's interesting to note that Jesus saw it simply as a part of any serious disciple's spiritual life. Notice that Jesus didn't say, "If you fast." No, Jesus said, "When you fast." For most of us, that means on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Needless to say, it's hard to get very good at something that we only do twice a year.

So, I looked up books about fasting and I settled on <u>Eat, Fast, Feast</u> by Jay W. Richards. The author is Catholic and he writes in a very engaging way. Maybe the timing was just right: I found the book to be fascinating right from the start. The central thesis is that, for a variety of reasons, Catholics have largely abandoned the spiritually potent practice of fasting. It's not so much that we no longer believe fasting to be a good thing. It's just that our standard American diet makes it practically impossible. And it all comes down to one thing: sugar.

For all of you with a sweet tooth (and that includes me), please don't stop reading just yet. Maybe a few facts will help to give us perspective. First, a century ago the average American consumed about 10 pounds of sugar per year. Now we're over 100 pounds of sugar per year. And the sugar comes in surprising forms. Just about all of our grains turn to sugar the moment they enter our mouths. That means bread, pasta, cereal, and a bunch of other things that we enjoy eating. Sugar, like most things, is okay in moderation. But consumed in the doses we're eating these days, so much sugar is leading to diabetes, joint inflammation, and obesity, just to name a few.

Reading this was startling. When I started to consider the multiple ways I consume sugar every day, I felt my pancreas sigh in relief, as if to say, "finally, he's starting to get it." And wouldn't you know it, just about this time I overdid it while hiking and ended up at the chiropractor with back issues and a lively sciatica. The chiropractor and I had a convincing chat about the food we eat and its connection to inflammation. Sometimes a perfect storm is just what we need for an old-fashioned awakening. Given the tenor of our times, maybe it's good for all of us to consider the merits of fasting and how it draws grace into our fallen world. Ponder the following quote from 4th century Saint Basil the Great:

"Fasting gives birth to prophets and strengthens the powerful; fasting makes lawgivers wise. Fasting is a good safeguard for the soul, a steadfast companion for the body, a weapon for the valiant, and a gymnasium for athletes. Fasting repels temptations, anoints unto piety; it is the comrade of watchfulness and the artificer of chastity. In war it fights bravely, in peace it teaches stillness."

It wasn't that long ago that Catholics fasted much more regularly. For example, there were four times a year that "ember days" were observed. These were always scheduled for the change of seasons and consisted of three days of fasting, namely Wednesday, Friday and Saturday of the four weeks chosen. Can you imagine fasting for more than one day in a week?! Once again, the problem is not that we're opposed to fasting. It's just that our standard American diet makes it very difficult. We need to free our bodies from their addiction to sugar. Because we eat so much of it, we're hungry a lot. Fasting more than six or eight hours is hard for us. Not eating for a whole day, given our present habits, leads to headaches, mental confusion, and hair loss.

Okay, the hair loss part I made up . . . I'm still trying to figure out why my brothers have more hair than I do. In a nutshell, Richards' book suggests a ketogenic diet, one that weans us from sugar and trains our body to burn more natural fats. Once the body adjusts, fasting for 12 or 16 or 24 hours becomes much more manageable. He offers a six-week trial so that we can discover the benefits of moderating our sugar and fasting on a regular basis. For the record, I'm going to give this a go. I already began on Monday and will conclude a couple of weeks before Christmas. The goal is to see if I am able to fast on a more regular basis (Catholics fasted regularly on Wednesdays and Fridays and added Saturday for the aforementioned ember days) and if my body feels better. I am telling you this in the event that you wonder why I look sad every time someone mentions chocolate!

Food, glorious food.... We are biological creatures, so we must eat to live. Fasting helps us to refrain from living to eat. When I was young, I used to laugh at the "healthy" food Father Hirsch ate. He said he was in it for the long haul and wanted to be able to serve God and His people with vim and vigor as he got older. And he's doing just that. Honestly, I'd like to do the same.

May God bless us with health and the freedom to worship Him in spirit and in truth!

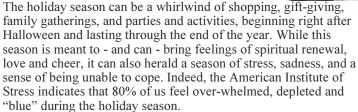
When doing student report cards, there was a comment the teacher could choose that read: inattentive and easily distracted. Could that comment describe your spiritual life? We can become so consumed with myriad distractions and preoccupations and lose our connection to what is really significant and important. We can become dull. This happens in our human relationships, too. We can easily take the love of others for granted, whether it be a parent, spouse, friend, or a child. We assume and presume that their love will always be there and do very little to cultivate, rejuvenate, and deepen it. Presumption can become a great sin.

We do the same thing with God and our spiritual lives. We presume that God will be merciful. Because we believe that in the end God is going to forgive us anyway, then why put a lot of effort into things now? What's the point? It's far easier to find a comfortable spot, curl up and take a nap! There is no immediate urgency to staying awake and attentive, so we think, and we simply fly by the seat of our pants. Assuming and presuming too much about our relationships, especially our relationship with God, can lead to neglect and abuse. It can even lead to a sense of entitlement, where we actually believe that something is due us without much effort on our part.

Folks who are distracted and preoccupied can find their relationships, especially the primary ones, drifting away. You can actually be married to someone for many years and wake up one morning realizing that you really do not know them or truly recognize them. We have to desire God in order to recognize God. We have to open our hearts, minds, and souls to His Presence so that we can be rejuvenated and refreshed. But we cannot do this if we are distracted or napping. We have to be awake and alert! As a young child eagerly watches for and anticipates that arrival of their parent home, so too we must watch for God's presence. If the anticipation of God's arrival does not excite us and rouse us, then we need to ask why. The wise person keeps vigilant watch, knowing that in the end they will not be disappointed.

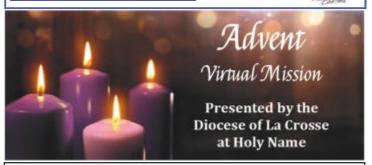

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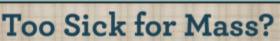
